Over the coming year we hope to build on this membership.



Our focus since re-forming has been to support the return of the parish groups working with children, young people, and adults at risk (this is the new term for what used to be vulnerable adults). Since June 2022 we have been working with parish groups to identify those volunteers needing vetted. Once a list was compiled, we either confirmed their current eligibility status to work in these groups or facilitated their recruitment process. To date there are fourteen volunteers for the youth programmes (children's liturgy, parish youth groups, sacramental preparation, and altar servers) and fifteen volunteers for adults (Eucharistic Ministers for the sick and housebound). All these volunteers have undergone the relevant diocesan safeguarding training before they can start to work in these groups. There are a further 9 potential volunteers currently undergoing the recruitment process.

Ensuring best practice as outlined by the diocesan safeguarding office is also within the safeguarding committee's remit. The committee have just completed the annual audit which is a vital tool in monitoring and reviewing the parish's compliance with diocesan safeguarding requirements. As a result of this year's audit, we are in the process of reviewing and renewing the noticeboards in the church and parish hall to ensure that all relevant information on safeguarding and on the use of CCTV and internet streaming is easily available. This will in time extend to the parish website.
